### Increase in Flinders Bay lease capacity to 300 tonnes per annum and Research Collaboration

## HIGHLIGHTS

- **Approval for additional Abitats** –Flinders Bay licence has been increased to 15,000 Abitats, estimated to have the potential to produce 300 tonnes per annum of greenlip abalone once developed.
- **Research collaboration** DPIRD and OGA will collaborate in scientific research focused on greenlip abalone growth, using the Company's leased area in Flinders Bay.

### DETAILS

Ocean Grown Abalone Ltd (ASX: OGA, or the Company) is pleased to announce:

#### **Ranch** expansion

The Western Australian Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) has provided approval to expand the number Abitats to 15,000 from the current 10,000 at the Company's Flinders Bay lease located in Augusta, Western Australia.

This will enable the Company to further expand the Flinders Bay ranches to an anticipated maximum capacity of 300 tonnes per annum from the current maximum capacity of 200 tonnes per annum.

#### **Collaboration of Scientific Research**

DPIRD and OGA will work in collaboration to undertake scientific research focused on growth optimisation of greenlip abalone.

The focus area of the scientific research will be the Company's ranch in Flinders Bay, which currently has greenlip abalone at various growth stages over its existing 10,000 Abitiats.

OGA sees the opportunity to work with DPIRD as a unique opportunity to develop the abalone industry in Western Australia.

#### **Economic development**

OGA is excited about the opportunities presented by the approval and the opportunity to work in collaboration with DPIRD. Importantly, the increase in Abitats and the research project provide further economic growth potential and job opportunities to the Augusta and Margaret River regions of Western Australia, through expansion of the broader abalone industry and through opportunities for OGA to expand its existing operations.
